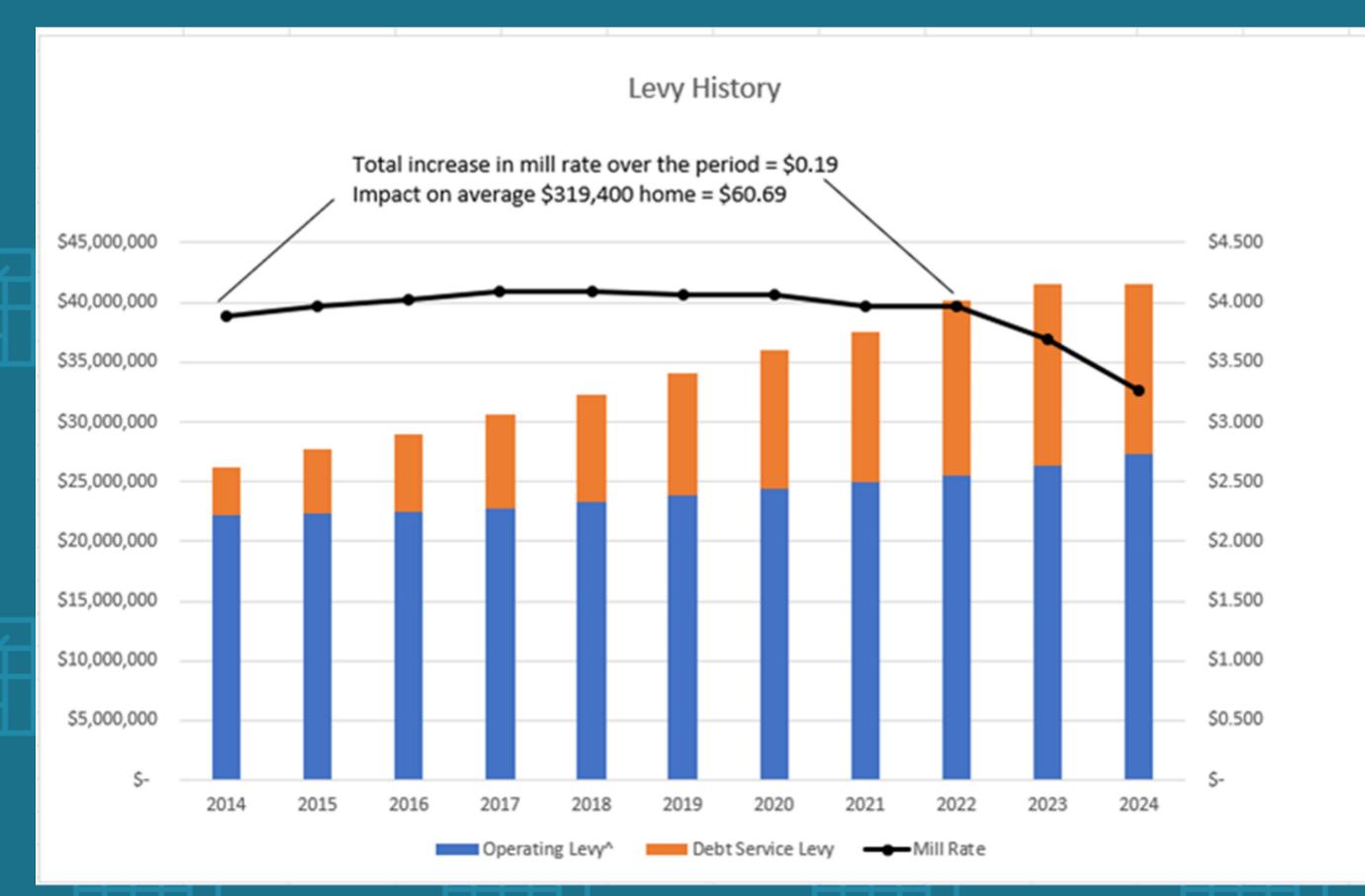

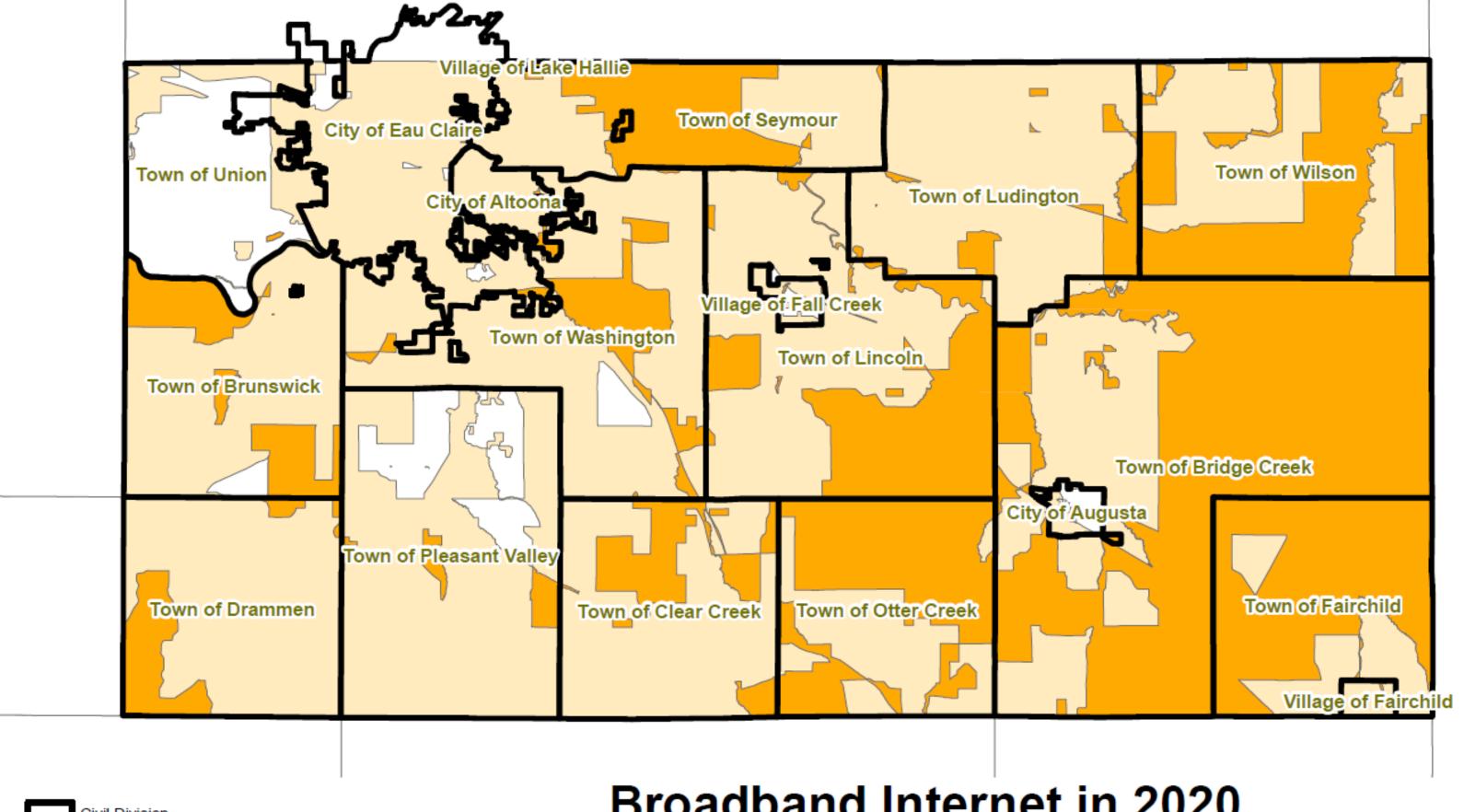

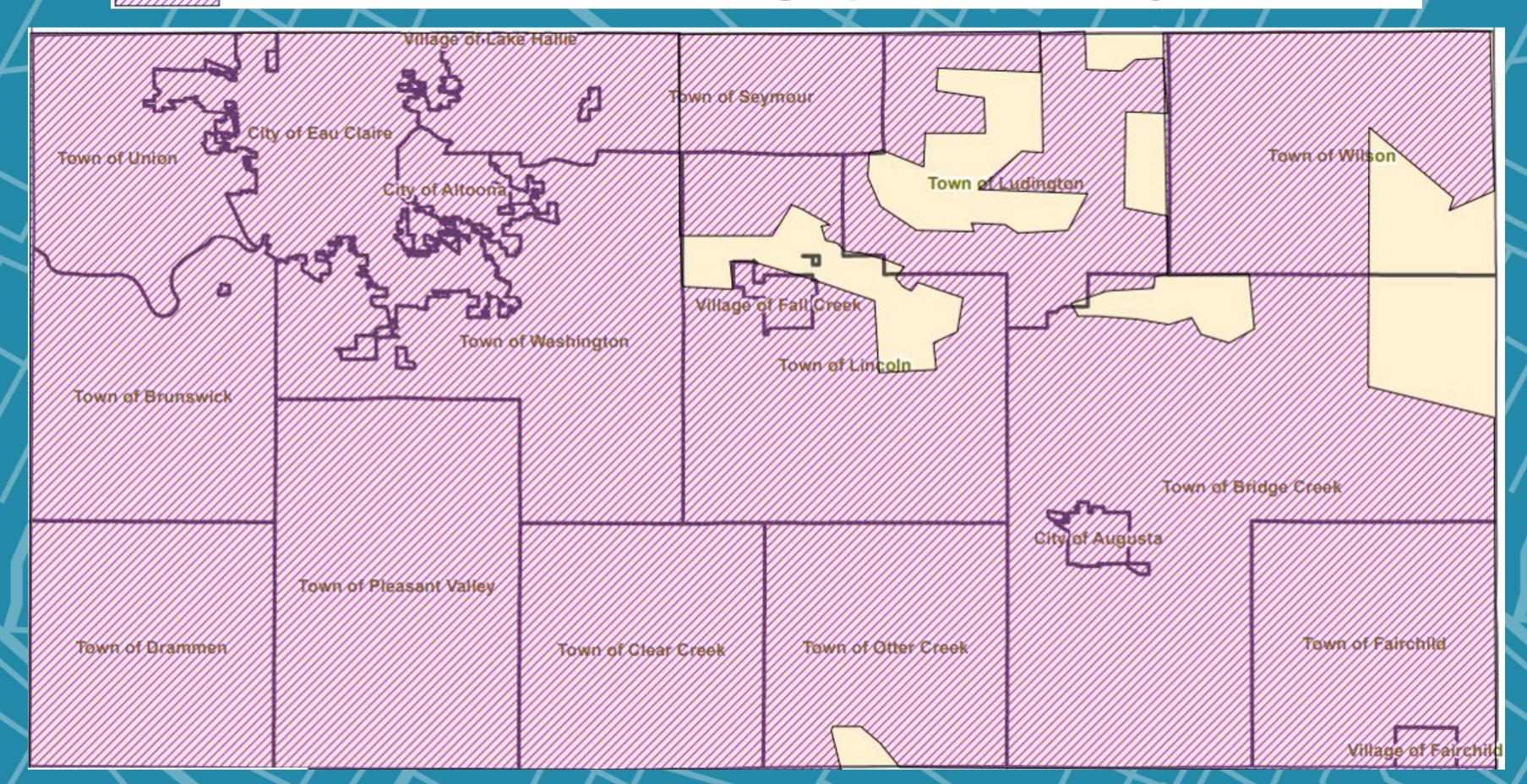

Arresting people is not a solution to most issues.







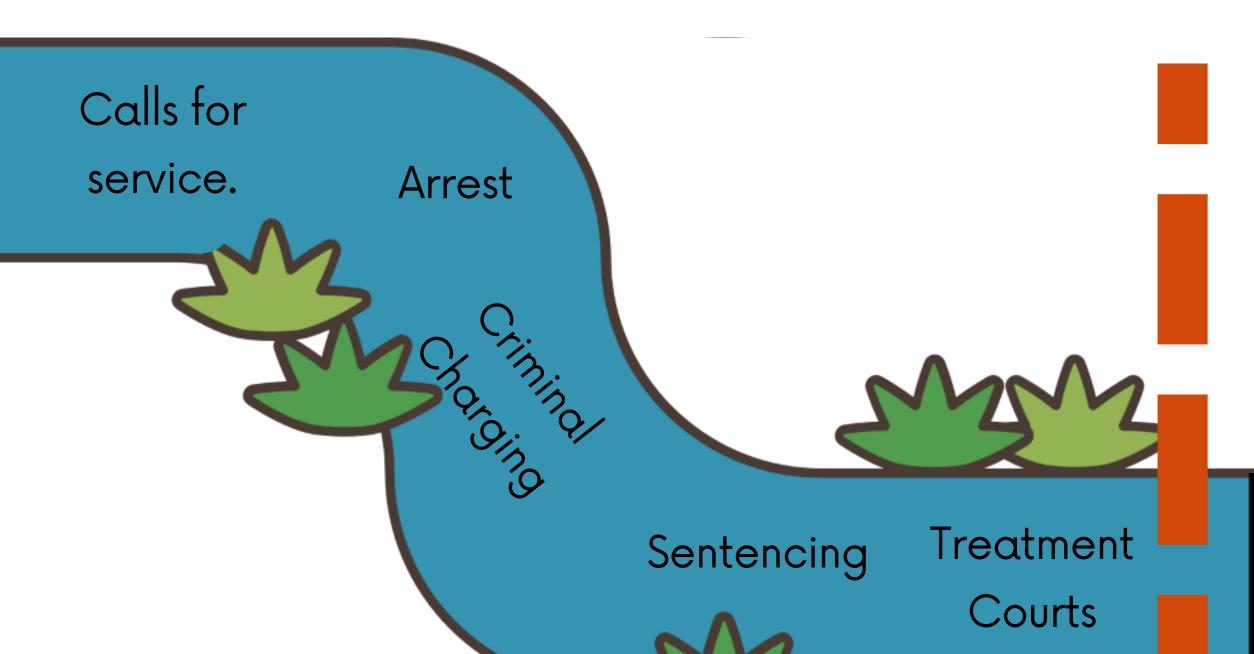
In 2021 we initiated the Law Enforcement co-responder program which provides clinical response to law enforcement contacts.

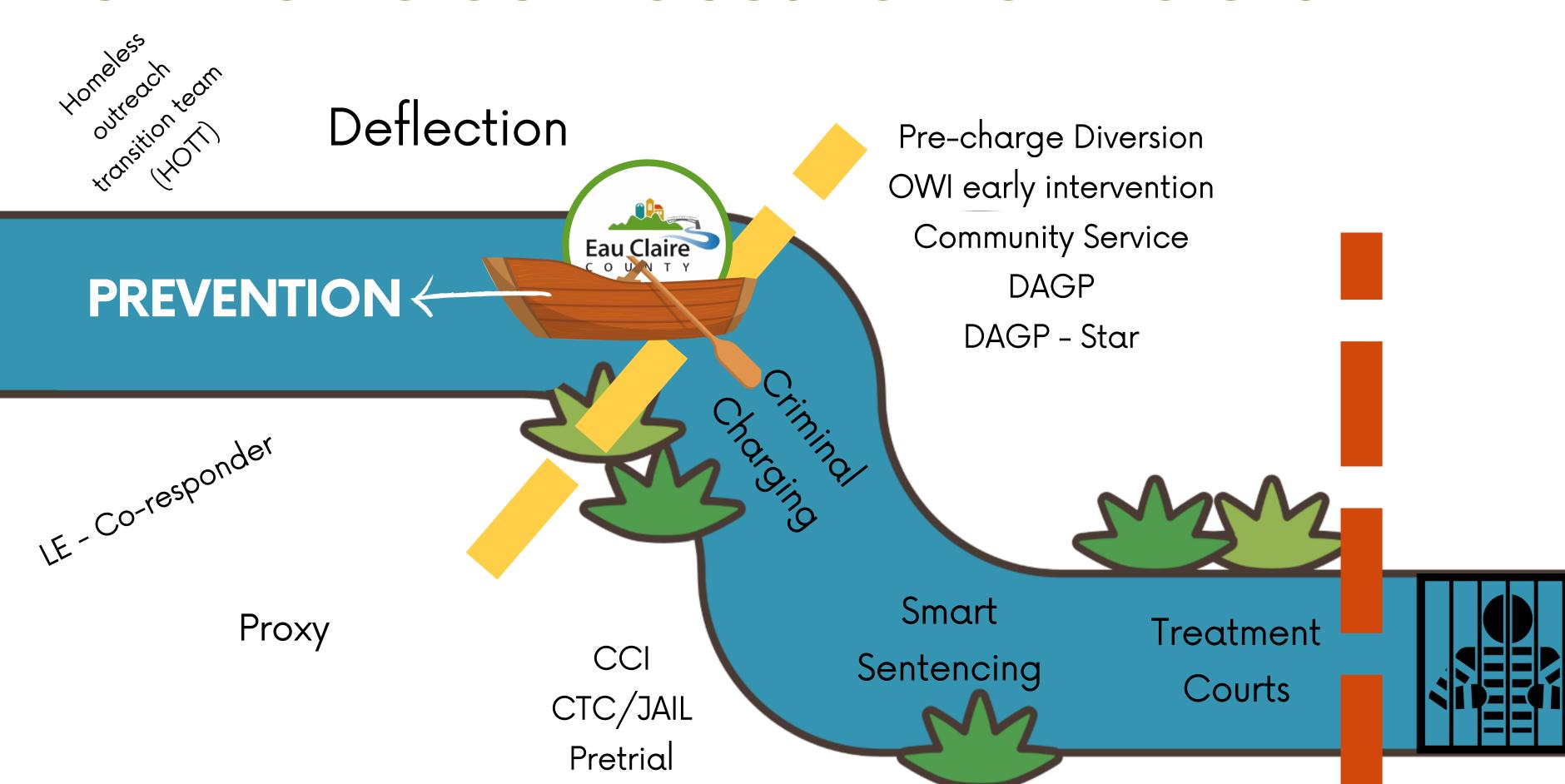

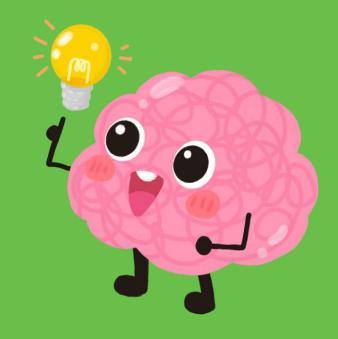
